

Toastmaster Leadership Institute

What is Toastmasters Leadership Institute (TLI)? A TLI is a recommended option for Districts to provide club officer training. The TLI format differs slightly from more traditional approaches to club officer training as it separates training into concurrent sessions or "courses". The primary purpose for a TLI is proper training of club officers, no other consideration may interfere with this objective.

Current and incoming club officers should attend a TLI. Toastmasters that do not hold an office, but that is interested in learning about or improving their Toastmaster leadership and communication skills may also attend, and this applies to guest as well.

For the winter club officers training the senior district officers have decided to put on a district-wide TLI for all the club officers to attend in Des Moines. The program will consist of past district governors as well as current district officers. What a way to start the second half of your Toastmaster year off with a very powerful, educational TLI put on by some of the best in the district.

The benefits are numerous for all of you wondering if you should attend. One it ensures that you will receive recognition in the Distinguished Club Program; clubs receive credit in the Distinguished Club Program for club officers trained. Also this is a great opportunity to surpass our current goal of 84% officers trained. Can you help me beat this goal?

Just remember the delivery of a TLI should support and not detract from the District/Club mission. The objectives of a TLI are to train club officers, help the District build clubs, assist clubs in attracting and keeping members, and encourage educational achievement within clubs. Mark your calendars the District TLI is coming in January 2006, plan to attend. ∞

Seasoned Toastmasters know our Toastmaster program year begins July 1 and ends the following year on June 30. Since this is the first opportunity to prepare a Transmitter article as Lieutenant Governor Marketing (LGM), it my first opportunity to wish all of you a happy and successful New Toastmasters Year.

With each new Toastmasters year comes new District Officers, new enthusiasm, new ideas and new goals. Our District Governor Marvin Johnson, like Immediate past District Governor Diane Stone, has one goal that the District be distinguished again for the year 2005-2006.

A third goal is strengthen clubs. Maybe your club achieved four or fewer goals toward the distinguished club designation last year. Don't give up. Again, Connie Gordon has a list to Toastmasters with energy and fresh ideas that can make a difference. Believe it or not, several clubs race to see which one is first to achieve all 10 distinguished club program goals. If you want this kind of energy in your club, contact me and we'll get the ball rolling.

You might be asking yourself, "What difference can I make?" Last year the District was distinguished by only one member. This achievement was possible because new clubs formed; new members joined established clubs, and members joined more than one club. Who was that "one" member that made the difference? It was all of us.

Let's step up to the plate again and become a Distinguished District for a second straight year!

Perhaps the biggest missed opportunity is the Toastmasters world available to you outside of your home club. Your dues provide access to clubs all over the world, entry to world-class training, and the excitement of watching or participating in speech contests. Are you using what you paid for?

How often have you thought, 'I wish someone would visit our club'? Do you take the opportunities that face you every day and ask someone to be your guest? Try something new, ask them to come with you and visit another club for the first time, be nervous together and face the unknown.

Ask your club to change the meeting place next month, just for one time, to face the unusual environment and different audience that might come to see what you are doing. Ask another club to exchange a speaker/evaluator team. Be a guest yourself in another type of club meeting such as a Rotary or Chamber of Commerce meeting. Push to use the skills you've been building.

Find out where other clubs meet, where educational training is being held, and check the 'help wanted' page to see who needs the skills you have. Looking to mentor or coach a club? Website Membership Tools!

You've just got to see this! A new light has been added to our District 19 website. It illuminates our target for a second Distinguished win! New this year is a report ranking clubs by membership size.

Near the top right hand corner of http://district19.us/ you'll find a "Currently Ranked" box. Inside that box click "Your DCP Status." The story in that report is crystal clear, Distinguished clubs meet the needs of their members. We ended last year with 35 Distinguished clubs. We need to end 2006 with a minimum of 45 Distinguished clubs to put District 19 back in the running with the big dogs.

Meeting our District membership goal has traditionally derailed our Distinguished effort. Yes, we did pull out all the stops and scrambled to meet our membership goals for our win, but we received a payoff. The word "Distinguished" has returned to our District vocabulary.

The purity of our win will only be realized if District 19 is Distinguished two years back-to-back. The last time our District pulled off back-to-back Distinguished wins was nineteen years ago, part of the longest Distinguished streak in our history. Would you believe five Distinguished years in a row? What makes that even more spectacular is that streak was preceded by a four year winning streak from 1979 to 1982.

How'd we do it back then? As a team we built memberships on two fronts early in our year and never let up.

Our formula made sense. Sixty memberships from one new club! A new charter adds twenty new memberships. It follows new clubs that renew on September 30th count a second time, and a third time the following March 31st. Another way to look at this is five new clubs chartering before September 30th means 300 memberships. How do we create five new clubs before September 30th? Those clubs are unfinished business carried over from the prior year. The time to win Distinguished is before September 30th. The energy flow simply never stops and is transmitted from year- to-year.

To focus our energy on following up new club leads with vigor, our D19 website has a tool available to all District EC members. That tool is found under the "New Clubs" link. This year our LGM Cliff Scherrer is skillfully using that new tool as a basis for our "All Star" baseball game pitting Apathy against District 19. As Team-19 hones our new-club-building skills and emphasis is placed on new members, memberships will become an automatic contributor to our being repeatedly Distinguished in the years ahead.

How about six consecutive Distinguished years? 2004 – 2010? I would encourage you to follow your clubs contribution to our membership building activity on our District 19 website! Let's set our course for a new District 19 Distinguished winning streak!

Out and About: Clubs, Contests, and Canada

Toastmasters affords us an opportunity to risk change in a friendly and supportive environment. The first time I attended any Toastmaster event outside my club was as a last minute speech contestant. Never having observed any speech contest, I wasn't prepared. I had broken that rule I grew up with in Girl Scouts: Be Prepared.

By visiting clubs other than my own and by attending as many club, area, and division contests as possible, I enjoyed the vast variety within the organization. The educational workshops at District and Region exceeded my expectations. I won my next speech contest...and another. What remained? Was I bored and ready to quit? No way!

The question came at the conclusion of a District Executive Committee Meeting: would anyone be interested in joining a carload driving to Toastmasters International Convention in Canada? Finally, I would hear the World Championship of Public Speaking!

This was a record year, the first time ten contestants had competed. Only two of those ten started their speech by immediately recognizing the audience. Echoing a winner several years ago who literally fell on his face at the beginning of his speech, many speakers employed physical elements: jumping off a stepstool, dropping to knees behind a line of orange traffic cones, or singing a Chinese lullaby.

Stefan Koehler began his speech with the "moo, moo" of dairy cows and squish, squish of fresh cow patties. His father escaped over the wall from East Germany. "Dad sacrificed, saving me from Communism." He had men sobbing over the story of accompanying his father on his return to reunified Germany 30 years later, driving by the house where he was born, and seeing his parents' graves.

Audience interaction reigned. One speaker ended in silence with a gesture, one taught us a Chinese toast with which we closed his speech. The validator, Lance Miller of California, ended with the audience concluding his speech with "ka-chink, ka-chink, ka-chink" that won him first place.

Erick Rainey of Edinburgh, Scotland, captured third place with words of wisdom to keep us involved in as many Toastmaster activities as we can. He told us that "television transports you to the land of not enough-ness. You end up shoulding all over yourself. It's up to you to fill your well."

In other words, you get out of Toastmasters what you put into it. Toastmasters isn't a spectator sport. All the action doesn't happen in a club meeting. Brief conversations are vivid memories: the gentleman from Dubai, United Arab Emirates, describing his homeland as we ate lunch from a street vendor on a picnic bench on the edge of Lake Ontario. The fastest growing area for Toastmasters clubs is in the Middle East. In the U.S.A., do we take our freedom of speech for granted?

At an education session, an attentive 8 year old Jamaican boy accompanied his mother. Half a dozen people asked him if he was going to be a Toastmaster someday. I told him my son was 10 the day we both attended our first Toastmasters meeting and that he had his 18th birthday and joined Toastmasters a few days before International Convention.

Sitting in my assigned row for the speech contest, I found myself (a calligrapher) next to a Past International Director from New Zealand (a collector of antique pen points). Not surprised, I had experienced such synchronicity in many conversations that weekend. At my table at the Saturday banquet sat a 55 year veteran Toastmaster and Past International Director who had been stationed during World War II at mechanics school at Fort Lee, Virginia, the same time as my father.

That reminds me to make a color copy of Dad's and husband's Army photos and my son's Civil Air Patrol photo for the memorial wall at the District 19 Conference. I hope to see you there.....OUT and ABOUT.

But can you imagine the excitement you will experience when that 8th grader who trembled with his icebreaker now steps up to the podium to give a keynote. Wow!!!! This is exactly what happens in Youth Leadership Programs.

The 2006 Spring Conference provides a wonderful opportunity for you to explore the Toastmaster International Youth Leadership Program (YLP). A panel discussion of YLP will be held on Friday afternoon. The panel will consist of people who have been involved in various aspects of the program. They will explain their involvement, benefits of the program and answer questions you have about YLP. We will also provide strategies and suggestions for starting a YLP in your area.

The winner of an area YLP speech contest will also offer a brief keynote address. Plan to listen to this young person; you'll be amazed at the impact YLP can have.

What can Youth Leadership do for your club?

- It can energize your members. Everyone
 who's been involved in a Youth Leadership
 Program has been pleasantly surprised by
 how much they can impact young people.
 They are excited about the skills and
 confidence they see developing in these
 young people and strive to continue their own
 development.
- 2. It can increase your membership. While participants of Youth Leadership aren't able to join Toastmasters, they are likely to join a club when they reach 18. They may also encourage their parents to join a club now.
- It is great publicity. Mass media sources love stories about children. Be sure to let them know about your program and invite them to the graduation banquet.
- 4. Provide opportunities to build new clubs. As word about the Youth Leadership Program spreads, so will interest in Toastmasters. You may find you are reaching people who need a meeting at a time or location you haven't considered yet. New clubs provide your members with opportunities to coach or sponsor.

Organizing a Youth Leadership Program should have the support of your entire club. TI prohibits charging a fee to participants of a YLP; but requires you to use their copyrighted materials. Your club should invest in the materials as a community service. Involving other club members in the promotion and delivery of the program is a great opportunity for each member's growth and may help their progress toward TI designations.


